Being Prepared & Proactive

I would like to thank everyone for their efforts as we have continued to increase our revenue and load counts. This is the result of everyone working together, becoming more efficient and being mindful of our customer's needs.

As noted in previous Tri-Staters, we continue to struggle at times in meeting our customer's expectations. I feel that the following areas are ones that we need to continue to address:

CSR Communication: Check and double-check to be sure that *ALL* requirements associated with a particular load are listed in Loadmaster with the load information. Some example are: Equipment type, (van vs flatbed trailer) Services re-

quired, (cleared vs non-cleared drivers) PO numbers, Directions (are specific instructions needed in order to pick-up or deliver).

Driver Managers: Constant review and verification of PTAs, which should assist in the planning function by improving asset utilization. This will also help us identify potential service failures so we can develop an alternate plan as well as communicate to the customer. Additionally, direct contact with the driver(s) via phone on each dispatch will eliminate issues that may slip through the cracks and ensure that our drivers are set-up for success.

Drivers: Review each and every Pre-Plan thoroughly. When necessary, inquire to the Driver Manager with regard to any aspect of the load that is unclear or requires clarification. Also, make immediate contact with the Dispatch/After Hours Dispatch group with delays, potential delays or problems. This way, the communication flow will allow us to keep the customer abreast of the situation as well as provide our Operations team with the opportunity to react accordingly.

In closing, our goal is to build upon

the recent success that we have achieved. By working together and being proactive, the sky is the limit!
