

Tri-State has been a member of NDTA since the late 1980's. It is with great honor that we will receive this 2019 NDTA Corporate Distinguished Service Award.


This award recognizes NDTA Corporate Members who have provided outstanding service in support of NDTA's goals and programs.

In 2008, the Management of Tri-State asked Twyla and Mark McDermott, who at that time were based in our Joplin, MO office, to move to Tennessee to manage a large DOE/NRC project that Tri-State had been contracted to do.

The project was going to require a lot of attention and close supervision. It was a 5 year contract, and the plan was for Twyla and Mark to return to Joplin at its end.

When they arrived in Tennessee, one thing they knew was that Tri-State had lost a lot of ground in the DOE market, especially in the Oak Ridge, TN area, due to several factors, including a lack of presence. So they set out to regain some of that market, as they were not willing to hang their hats on this one project. As it turned out that was the right course of action because that particular contract never quite came to its projected outcome.

With support and help from a lot of people they added Driver Teams and regained some ground with old customers, along with gaining new customers. Tri-State's share of the market grew.



TSMT Missouri plates are going thru renewals. The registrations (cab cards) will expire the end of September. The registrations will be filed in the Driver Permit Room, and are on


the Images tab in Loadmaster for easy access by most office personnel. They can be emailed, faxed, or printed. Be sure to check your registration's expiration date.

Ingredients for Maple Dijon Vinaigrette

- 2 tbs extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tbs apple cider vinegar
- 1 tbs maple syrup
- 1 1/2 tsp Dijon mustard
- Salt and pepper to taste



- 2. Top with dried cranberries, pecans, feta cheese, apples and bacon
- 3. Add all the ingredients for the vinaigrette to a small mason jar. Shake to mix and pour over the salad. The dressing recipe makes enough for two salads.
